# European Go Congress in Villach, Austria

**...was due to begin on Saturday July 14. This year, a record number of participants from Finland was expected: 30 registered in total. On arrival in Vienna international airport at 9.40 am, the weather was already hot at 27 C.**

Fortunately, Antti Holappa who had arrived in Vienna the day before, was waiting for us with our air conditioned rental car. In the car were traveling also Antti Törmänen and Ilkka Mattila from Oulu, and Fredrik Blomback from Sweden. Pretty soon after the flatlands of Lower Austria and Burgenland around and south of Vienna, the terrain became mountainous. As there was no speed limit most of the time on the southern motorway A2, the average speed of traffic was about 140-160 km/h. We stopped for lunch in Graz, Arnold Schwarzenegger's hometown, and tried to find the Terminator statue erected for his honor, without luck.

The registration procedure for the congress in Villach was not quite as streamlined as possible. We had to stand in line twice: once to receive a pre-filled form we were supposed to check and another time to pay for our accommodation. Antti Holappa offered to take everybody's luggage to the youth hostel, after which he was to return the car in Klagenfurt some 40 km away. Having no bag with me, I managed to lose the receipt for my accommodation payment during the welcoming party. Fortunately, I informed the organizers who later remembered me and confirmed my payment on the phone to the youth hostel on my arrival there. Despite minor shortcomings, I found the attitude of the general organizing staff to be helpful and friendly. That very Saturday evening we found Moby Dick, a bar across the river from the congress centre, later to become the official after-go meeting place for the congress participants.

On Sunday morning, after a good night's sleep, the main tournament started. To my dismay, I found out that I'd been paired against Javier-Aleksi Savolainen. When I asked the organisers whether pairings of players of the same country below the McMahon top bar were intentional the reply was that one of the options of the pairing program was set wrong before the already belated first round and that it would be corrected. I did win the game, fortunately. The first week of the main tournament went extremely well for the Finnish dan players. Tuomo Salo had won all his five games and Miika Nikula, Ilkka Mattila, Pekka Lajunen, and myself had won four games each. Vesa, Matti, and Antti Törmänen had won two of their first opponents, including Pal Balogh

and Li Ting, both 6 dan, by Matti. After the second round, three Finns were in the top eight! According to a rumor I heard later, Pal Balogh had been very unlucky: having lost his luggage on Saturday, he was left with only the clothes he was wearing at the time of his arrival and had been forced to sleep on the gym floor without a mattress. On Wednesday, Antti Holappa, Jaakko Virtanen, and I traveled by train up the Drau river valley to the town of Spittal. Our intent was to hike to the summit of Goldeck. Just like the entire first week, the day was very hot with daily maximums hovering at about 35 C and the sun scorching at full power from a cloudless sky. We took a cable lift to a higher station at 1650 m above sea level (about 1100 m higher than Spittal) and decided to hike to the top at 2140 m. The air was clearly cooler than down in the valley, maybe between 25 and 30 degrees. In a meadow some distance up, there were cows from a nearby village enjoying the day lying in the grass. There was nice gasthaus with cold beer just above the treeline. We arrived at the summit after 2-3 hours of hiking. The view was magnificent. To the north were a couple of snow-capped peaks somewhat higher than 3000 m above sea level.

The weekend tournament also went well for the Finns, as expected. But the draw left a lot to be desired. This time, I had to play two Finns. After my having lost to Miika Nikula in the first round, they paired my up with Deni Seitz. When we asked the organizers what was up with the draw, they brushed us off telling us our problem was one of the minor ones, and that if the settings of the pairing program were to be touched "there was going to be trouble". We were left to wonder whether it was a good idea to run a 400-participant tournament using an unfamiliar pairing program. The organizers of an international tournament should be thoroughly familiar with the pairing software they are using. There were people taking part in the tournament who had traveled from abroad for the weekend tournament only.

When the second week began the Finnish winning percentage dropped as expected in a McMahon tournament after a good start. I lost also in the seventh round after a life-and-death blunder costing me 15 stones. I cut down on time spent at Moby Dick and started winning again. In the end, out of the eleven Finnish dan players who played all their games in the main tournament, two won 7/10, five won 6/10, three won 5/10, and one 3/10. Vesa's final position was 10th, an all-time best for a Finnish player. The tournament winner was Hong Seok Ui from Korea. European Championship was won by Ilya Shikshin from Russia. Were it not for Park Jong Wook's sudden lung infection and absence from rounds 8 and 9, the results could've been different. Wook did not lose a single game out of the eight he played whereas Hong Seok Ui had lost to him.

Overall, this year's European Go Congress was a pleasant experience. Despite the heat, which in itself made afternoons spent on the beaches nearby or at the spa wonderful and evenings comfortably warm, the main playing hall in the modern congress centre was cool and shady. A minor problem was that the two rooms for the top players were somewhat inadequately air conditioned. The venue being a new congress centre still by far exceeded the usual standards of an EGC venue, thanks to generous support from the sponsors, including the city of Villach. Also thanks are in order to the mayor of Villach who gave special permission to pubs and bars to keep their terraces open until midnight.

# European Student Go Championship 2007 in Stockholm

The European Student Go Championship tournament 2007 was played in Stockholm 6th-8th August. Seven players from Finland participated.

The official representatives of Finland were Mika Urtela 3 dan and Suvi Leppänen 1 kyu. The others were Mikko Siukola 3 dan, Miika Nikula 3 dan, Samuel Ritakallio 1 kyu, Janne Nikula 1 kyu and Kalle Timperi 2 kyu. The EGF-referee of the tournament, Teemu Rovio 2 dan, was also from Finland.

The tournament venue was a local chess club, which I think was an excellent choice for a tournament of this size. It has one big room for playing, a small room for reviewing games, and a cafeteria. Accommodation was organised at Zinkensdamm Hostel about 1 km from the tournament venue.

On the first evening, the players formed national teams to compete at miniature golf on the nearby course. Unfortunately, the Finnish team was very small - only me and Teemu. Minigolf should have a handicap system; we really would have needed some help against the almost-professional top three teams: France, Sweden and Spain. :)

Two Korean female professionals were present to give lectures and review games. I was very pleased with their teaching, and I'm sure the other players agree with me on this.

The Student Championships are actually two interlaced tournaments. Two best males and one female become the official representatives of Europe in the World Student Championships. After five rounds, I was lucky enough to have the same McMahon score with Manuela Marz, 3 dan from Germany, so the organisers paired us manually and we played the ladies' final. Manuela won, as expected. The male representatives are Benjamin Papazoglou, 5 dan from France, and Martin Jurek, 4 dan from Czechia. Congratulations!

I was very satisfied with the tournament and my results in it. This was the first time I managed to find the perseverance for playing slowly and thinking of the moves instead of quickly following my intuition. I wish this is a turning point for my play and not only a one-time quirk.

Though I admit that in a way I secretly like Ing clocks, hearing "Black time limit thirty seconds left one time!" is something I don't enjoy too much. In his brilliant novel, First kyu, Sung-Hwa Hong writes: "People who have experienced second counting, especially during the last minute, all say they felt their blood drying up". Before this tournament I didn't realise how true it is. In Finland, we usually use Canadian overtime instead of Japanese byo-yomi and as said, I usually play quite quickly.

There was only one flaw I heard anyone mentioning; the tournament dates. The tournament started on Monday and ended on Wednesday. For many it'd be easier to go to a weekend tournament.

I would like to thank the tournament organisers for a very nice event. I really enjoyed the tournament and my visit to Stockholm. Thanks to Stockholm go club, who sponsored the minigolf tournament. Also I'd like to thank the cafeteria keeper who saved us from starvation on the afternoon it rained so heavily that we were forced to stay inside all through the lunch break. Greetings to all the participants, I'm hoping to meet you all again soon!



## Leksand Open 2007

I år blev det sjunde gången vi tack vare Martin Stiassny samlades i Leksand för sommarens go-fest. Från de första två årens lite småskaliga och mysiga helgturnering med 24 respektive 31 deltagare i Hjulbäcks bystuga och med Eddies oförglömliga kinesiska smörgåsbord växte turneringen ut både till ett nästan en vecka långt go-läger och kvantitativt till Sveriges största och mest internationella turnering. Rekordåret var 2003, fortfarande i Hjulbäck, med 106 deltagare, fortfarande den största turneringen i Norden sedan EM i Köpenhamn 1982. Deltagarantalet var nere i 46 förra året men stannade i år på 77.

Under åren har professionella från Kina, Japan och Korea medverkat i Leksand. Sedan 2004 spelas i Gymnasieskolans matsal, i anslutning till Sammildalsgruppen i centrala Leksand. Nästa år blir det ett uppehåll i serien av Leksandsturneringar, eftersom vi då får ett EM runt samma grop i månadsskiftet juli-augusti. Möjligen kan Leksand Open 2009 komma att hamna på den trevliga folkhögskolan på andra sidan om älven, men det blir en senare fråga.

I år var de sympatiska koreanska proffsen Young Sun Yoon 5p och Seung Hee Kang 2p med i Leksand igen, liksom 2004. Som ett par tidigare år spelades bland annat en match mellan Norden och Övriga världen (dvs i praktiken Tyskland och Holland), samt rengo för tremannalag där även proffsen var med, simultanpartier och en seriös huvudturnering (Pandanet Super European Cup). Tack vare att Leksand Open spelades i anslutning till student-EM i Stockholm i år fick vi troligen med ett par extra toppspelare: Merlijn Kuin 6d från Holland och Igor Nemly 5d från Ryssland. Totalt var det spelare från 8 länder i Leksand. Särskilt glädjande var att vi fick med en grupp om hela 15 spelare från Ukraina i huvudturneringen, med Vasili Skochko 4d i spetsen. De hörde av sig några veckor före turneringen och sa att de tänkte komma till Leksand med buss. Vi var nog lite klentrogna till en början och det var en del trassel med inbjudningarna, men de dök faktiskt upp i Leksand på utsatt tid. Deras tolk Kateryn – en 19-årig tjejer som talar engelska, franska och tyska

flytande och börjar på någon svår utbildning i biokemi i Kiev i höst – berättade att de tittat lite på St Petersburg, Helsingfors och Stockholm på vägen. I våras var de på liknande sätt med i Paris Open. Eftersom den ukrainska gruppen kom in i bilden så sent gick det inte att få in dem på något boende i närheten, t.ex. Leksands Camping, utan de hamnade lite avsides på Sollerön, så vi såg inte så mycket av dem på kvällarna.

Själv tillbringade jag de första dagarna mest med att titta på boende och sådant i Leksand och Tällberg inför EM, så jag missade mycket av sidoaktiviteterna. En intressant upplagd sak där jag var med på ett hörn var när vi spelade upp ett parti på demobräde, två och två fick vi gå fram och göra tre drag var och proffsen kommenterade. Kanske var det lite sparsamt med kommentarerna ibland, men det verkar vara ett bra format för kommentarer. Under huvudturneringen var det som vanligt fint väder och många tog med sig sina bord ut för att spela utomhus, det är trevligt.

Hemmalaget vann matchen mot tyskar och holländare. I rengoturneringen vann lag San Xiao Zhu (Klas Almroth, Fredrik Blomback och Christoffer Strömberg) med fyra raka vinster före de proffsförstärkta lagen Power och Sam-Sam. I huvudturneringen vann vår nya svensk-kinesiska spelare Ying Gu Wei 5d med fem raka vinster före Merlijn Kuin och Igor Nemly. En hedrande fjärdeplats gick till Fredrik Blomback, Stockholm, före bl.a flerfaldige titelhållaren Willemkoen Pomstra

Det ble delt ut 2 bokpremier: en til Lars Valle som beste 2-sifret kyu-spiller, og en til Jan Kristian Haugland som beste Bergensspiller. Tre spillere fra Bergen er ganske sikkert ny rekord i et Norgesmesterskap!

Så bør det nevnes at turneringen var meget nær den store katastrofen før den i det hele tatt var kommet i gang. Da vi skulle rydde unna etter første dag oppdaget vi at gulvet inn til rommet hvor vi oppbevarer alt spillemateriellet vårt var nymalt og sperret av! Alternativ oppbevaring lot seg selvsagt løse på et vis, men arrangørene ble særdeles svette under armene ved tanken på hva vi skulle ha gjort hvis malerne hadde startet opp jobben litt tidligere...



## 52nd EUROPEAN GO CONGRESS LEKSAND SWEDEN 2008 26<sup>th</sup> July — 9<sup>th</sup> August

# Preparations for EGC in Leksand

The preparations for the 52nd European Go Congress in Leksand, July 26th – August 9th next year are proceeding roughly as expected.

It is now possible to register at the congress website (<http://egc2008.eu>). The website has plenty of information, photos and interactive maps to help the registrant in finding accommodation and planning his or her stay.

Payments of the registration fee and booking fees can be made online with any of the major credit cards. Well over 200 playing participants from 22 countries have in fact already registered (mid October).

The organisers have reserved more than 700 beds in and around Leksand. The prices range from camping, hostels and simple cottages at 13 Euro per person and night, over bed and breakfast in double rooms or beds in cottages with higher standard at around 25 Euro per night up to single rooms in hotels at 80-90 Euro per night. Only a few accommodation alternatives are fully booked by mid October. However, early registrants inevitably have a wider choice of accommodation.

Leksands town council has been very helpful and supportive of the go congress, and so are practically everybody whom we have been in contact with. The town council is for instance going to organise a public Japan weekend in the middle of the congress, August 2-3. This means that there will be very many interesting Japan related side activities during the weekend. The Swedish Shogi association has for example decided to hold the Swedish shogi team championship outdoor in Leksand during that weekend, as well as probably an open shogi tournament on the Sunday or Monday. We are looking into the possibilities to arrange some special events related to China and Korea as well during the congress. A computer go event is planned for the Wednesday of the second week.


Another interesting special event which is being planned is an international symposium on the history of go, and the representation of go in art and literature. This event is planned in collabora-

ration with the Nordic Confucius Institute and the Department of Oriental Languages at Stockholm University. Possibly the historical symposium may be combined with the International Conference on Baduk, which has already been arranged a couple of times before, in Korea or in Europe. The symposium is planned for the first congress week, mainly the first Wednesday.


As usual the go congress is thought of as a holiday project, this year also a family-friendly one – don't miss our family discount on the registration fee! More details about the congress schedule, side activities, recreational possibilities and so on will appear on the congress website as soon as they are decided.

We are now in the process of inviting professionals to the congress. We are counting on at least 10 professional guests from Japan, Korea and China. In particular we hope to see Saijo sensei again in Leksand 2008, the long standing favourite of the European go players, although he is now formally retired from the Nihon Kiin. To this end it is possible to contribute a modest sum towards the travel expenses when registering.



## Fuseki Answers

### Answer 1

Stay away from strength; give yourself enough space to extend. Play on the 3rd line for territory (or to put it another way, play on the third line for a base). These three basic rules dictate that White 1 is the correct move. When in doubt go back to basics they really do help.

### Answer 2


Neither side have any obvious weak groups nor a great moyo in need of reduction, so the next thing to do is probe where your opponent is thinnest. In this case the large knight's shimari in the lower left corner is the weak point. Black 1 is the correct move, it threatens to attack while at the same time laying claim to some of the bottom side.


The first rule of the opening is defend weaknesses before making big moves. White's stone in the lower left needs help and the best way is to make territory. It may not be much but White is not just alive, he is making points. Failure to defend this stone would give Black a great target – there is nothing bigger on the board.


There are no weak groups, both players have substantial moyos, so it is all about territory. The biggest point is the 3x3 in the lower left corner. It is possible to play 10 x 10 but this is very airy and uncertain. Taking the corner from White is profitable and secure.





White 1 is correct, it prevents Black building in front of his shimari in the upper left while extending the base of White's two stones on the upper side.


There are several big points on the board, Black's problem is not finding a place to play but how to gain the most. White's two stones in the upper left are 'light' – or to put it another way, White is happy to give up one if there is a splitting move. Black 1 is the correct move, this enclosed White's right. White has to defend and that gives Black the time to play 3 on the lower side.


White cannot take any big points until he does something about his weak stones on the upper right side. The best way of doing that is 1, now both players can get back to building their moyos.


There are no weak groups, so it is simply a question of finding the biggest area and taking the best point. The upper side is not developable for White, nor is the right side – this means the bottom side is most important. Black 1 is correct it is a double moyo move and the biggest thing on the board.








Again there are no weaknesses, but this time all the big points have been taken. White 1 on the upper side reducing Black's moyo is the right move. The normal continuation of 2 and 4 by Black are countered by White running into the centre.

### **Answer 10**

Black has a nice wall but White's stones on the right side limit its value. On the other hand White's stones are a long way apart. Black 1, dividing White's stones makes good use of the wall and starts a running fight that will benefit Black. White 2 can be expected and Black must respond with 3. Remember, when you have a wall you may not profit directly from its power, the profit may appear somewhere else on the board. In this case Black will build more on the lower side than he would without the wall.

When thinking about fuseki always remember...

#### **Always consider your opponent**

If you know what your opponent wants you can adjust your game accordingly. If you never think about your opponents aims your strategy will be incomplete.

#### **Urgent points before big points**

Defend your own weaknesses or attack your opponent's weaknesses before taking big moves.

#### **Corners before sides before the centre**

Elementary I know, but many people forget that corners can deliver efficient territory.

#### **Make your stones work together**

If all your stones work together with the same end in mind you will have a formidable position, equally if you can disrupt your opponent's position you will aid your cause immensely.

#### **Build a balance between the 3rd and 4th lines**

If you do not have a balanced position you create weaknesses that your opponent can exploit. So use both the 3rd and 4th lines and keep balanced.

#### **Take double moyo points first**

Look for the developable areas for both players, if there is an area where both can develop potential take that first, it has almost double the value of a building move on its own.

#### **Third line for territory, fourth line for influence**

Decide what you want and play the most appropriate move. If you need a base or want territory play on the 3rd line, if you want influence or a moyo play on the 4th line.

#### **Find the area, then find the move**

Mechanical I know, but if you first decide the region to play it is a lot simpler to find the right move. If you have trouble finding the right move, you may not thinking broadly enough – take a step back, check the strategic area and then look for the move.
